Sunday 2nd.August 2020

After 19 weeks of no services at St. Stephens and West as a result of the Governments lockdown restrictions the church reopened its doors again on the 2nd. August 2020.

Thanks were expressed to Ron our Session Clerk and Toni our Clerk to the Board for their efforts in getting us back to the kirk and making the necessary arrangements to meet the guidelines set down by the Government.

Arrangements included registering those attending at each service, hand sanitisation stations, maintaining social distancing at all times, no printed order of service and no singing of hymns. All very strange but necessary to meet the requirements.

Although no hymns were sung our organist Alex Perry played 3 verses of each hymn chosen for the service. Since the 2nd.August some members are bringing their own hymn books to read while a hymn is being played. Fun with Furniture

I have been making things from wood since I was about 7 years of age. In fact I still possess (and occasionally use) chisels and a plane that I was given for my 14th Birthday. Fast-forward to the early 1980s when I was appointed to a senior academic post in the University of Dundee. My work had always occupied an important part of my life but from then it progressively took over my life – a situation that I loved but, of course, it was at the cost of other interests. My workshop gradually fell into disuse; many of my tools deteriorated.

On retirement, therefore, I was determined that I would take up wood work again but now, it would be high quality furniture-making done to professional standards. To that end, I refurbished the workshop, re-equipped it with a wide range of hand tools as well as machinery – a turning lathe and other cutting machines that would allow me incorporate professional touches such as moulded edges and inlaying with contrasting colours of timber (fig 1)











Early efforts were two occasional mahogany tables (figs 2 and 3) which involved turning as well as conventional carpentry.

The lamp table in fig.4 is made from English walnut with inlaid boxwood stringing.

The hall table in fig 5 is of American black walnut and features a curved front panel. Several of my pieces have ended up in the homes of our daughters. One such is a small hall table of contemporary design in oak and ash. (Fig 6)


As we never seem to throw out books, there is a continual need for book storage. The open bookcase in fig. 7 is constructed in oak and. The joints between the shelves and ends are reinforced with oak dowels, which form an attractive feature. A wall-mounted bookcase in mahogany (Fig 8) saves floor space! The doors of the small chest in American black walnut (fig 9)

have a central panel surrounded by boxwood inlayed stringing. The panels are made from hand cut veneers mounted in so-called "book-matched" form. This gives an attractive symmetry to the natural figuring of the timber.



Quite my most ambitious project has been the chest of drawers in Brazilian mahogany (fig 12). As with all the drawers that I make, they feature hand-cut dovetails (fig13) - considered by some to be a hall-mark of quality furniture.








